Rebound cholinergic syndrome is a rare, but well known unwanted phenomenon occurring after abrupt clozapine discontinuation. There have been previous reported cases of cholinergic rebound in the literature; however, these reports described cholinergic rebound following cessation of high doses of clozapine in patients diagnosed with schizophrenia. Here, we report a case of rebound cholinergic syndrome and catatonia in a male patient three days after abrupt discontinuation of 50 mg of ...

Up to 30% of patients who stop taking SSRIs develop discontinuation symptoms. 4 Six symptom clusters—disequilibrium, sensory symptoms, general somatic symptoms, sleep disturbance, GI symptoms, and affective symptoms—characterize the SSRI discontinuation syndrome . 5 The four most common symptoms—in decreasing order of frequency—are dizziness, nausea, lethargy, and headache. 6 Ataxia, sensory abnormalities, and possibly aggressive and impulsive behavior differentiate this ...

Tips to manage and prevent discontinuation syndromes ...

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Therefore, rapid withdrawal of these agents may precipitate cholinergic rebound, which can be associated with vomiting, nausea, headache, sweating, and muscle spasms. Cholinergic rebound can also apply to other antidepressants with anticholinergic properties that may be discontinued abruptly, such as paroxetine. 2

(Redirected from SLUDGE syndrome) A cholinergic crisis is an over-stimulation at a neuromuscular junction due to an excess of acetylcholine (ACh), as a result of the inactivity of the AChE enzyme, which normally breaks down acetylcholine.

Drug-induced cholinergic overdrive mimics symptoms produced by the withdrawal of neuroleptics. Anticholinesterases, by virtue of this mechanism (cholinergic overdrive), produce a syndrome marked by lassitude, irritability, dysphoria or depressed mood, emotional lability, restlessness, slowing of thought, insomnia, nausea, vomiting, and diarrhea.

Many drugs have anticholinergic properties, meaning they inhibit the neurotransmission of acetylcholine in the brain. Drugs with anticholinergic effects prevent acetylcholine from binding to receptors, resulting in therapeutic effects. There are three major types of anticholinergic drugs including: antimuscarinics, ganglionic inhibitors, and neuromuscular inhibitors - the majority being ...
